DYNAMITE Makes a Difference

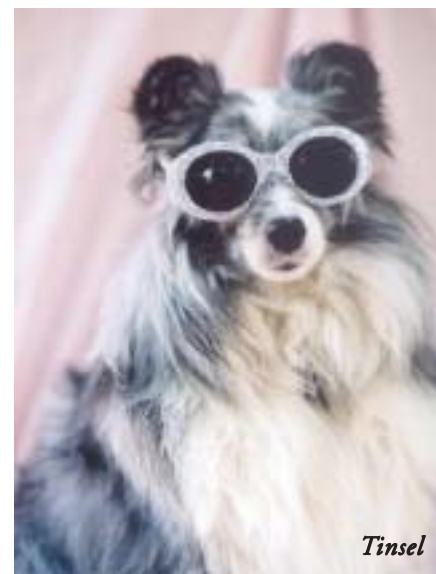
